PEER COACHING

The Peer Coaching Program, supported by Microsoft Corporation and created by the Puget Sound Center for Teaching, Learning and Technology (PSCTLT), is a proven methodology for training teacher leaders to serve as peer coaches for their colleagues. Many educators will attest to the transformative power of peer coaching and its ability to alter practices and beliefs. Peer Coaching is a practical way to deliver the ongoing, consistent support essential to assist teachers to improve their craft and increase student achievement. Peer coaches help other colleagues in their schools integrate technology into classroom learning activities and improve lesson design by incorporating engaging strategies such as project-based learning.

The program was developed at the Puget Sound Center as part of a U.S. Department of Education grant in 2002. Then in 2004 Microsoft licensed the curriculum making it the first of their Partners in Learning leadership programs. Since its inception, Peer Coaching has trained in 47 different countries and various states in the US. Each has aligned the Peer Coaching Program with country or district initiatives and has successfully replicated the program repeatedly.

Why should I use Peer Coaching in my school?



When teachers are asked who they look to for guidance and training on how to use technology in their classrooms the vast majority of them say they would look to another teacher in their school. Why? They trust their peers and they know that help from this trusted source is there when they need it.

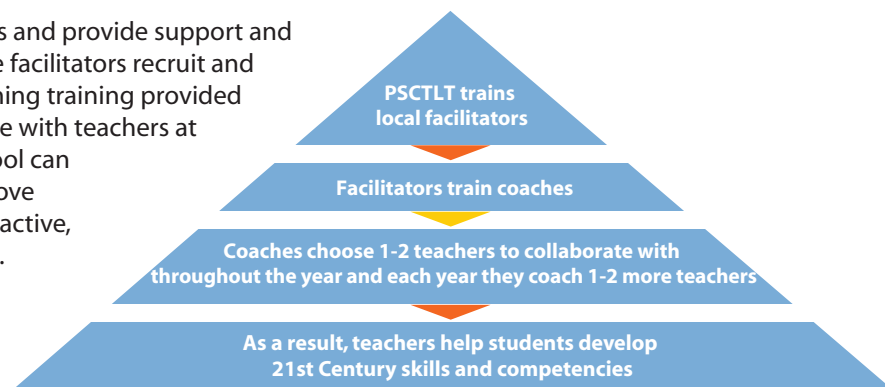
It is widely believed that while more teachers are proficient in technology skills today than they were even five years ago, only about 15-20% are effectively integrating those skills into their teaching. This should not be too surprising. Around the world, the methods used to help teachers develop technology skills, comfort, and knowledge to use those skills have had little lasting effects due to the lack of support after the initial training.

The goal of Peer Coaching is to help schools to create systemic capacity to provide professional development by promoting the participation of school administrators as well as coaches and providing them with an ongoing online community to continue learning long after the initial training. In a time of budget cuts and department reorganizations, schools are challenged to do more with less. Peer Coaching provides effective, affordable teacher professional development.

How does Peer Coaching work?

The Puget Sound Center staff train facilitators and provide support and advice as they implement Peer Coaching. The facilitators recruit and train coaches in local schools. The Peer Coaching training provided by these facilitators helps coaches collaborate with teachers at their schools so that each teacher in the school can strengthen the quality of learning, and improve student learning by providing students with active, engaging, technology-rich learning activities.

The program and curriculum is adaptable for each country or state's needs, but the basic structure is as displayed on the right:



Who is using Peer Coaching?

Peer Coaching is currently being implemented in 47 different countries and ten states within the United States. To date, nearly 1,100 facilitators have been trained around the world, reaching hundreds of thousands of coaches and teachers on an ongoing basis.

We lead regional facilitator training workshops to help schools build their own capacity to create and sustain a Peer Coaching program.
